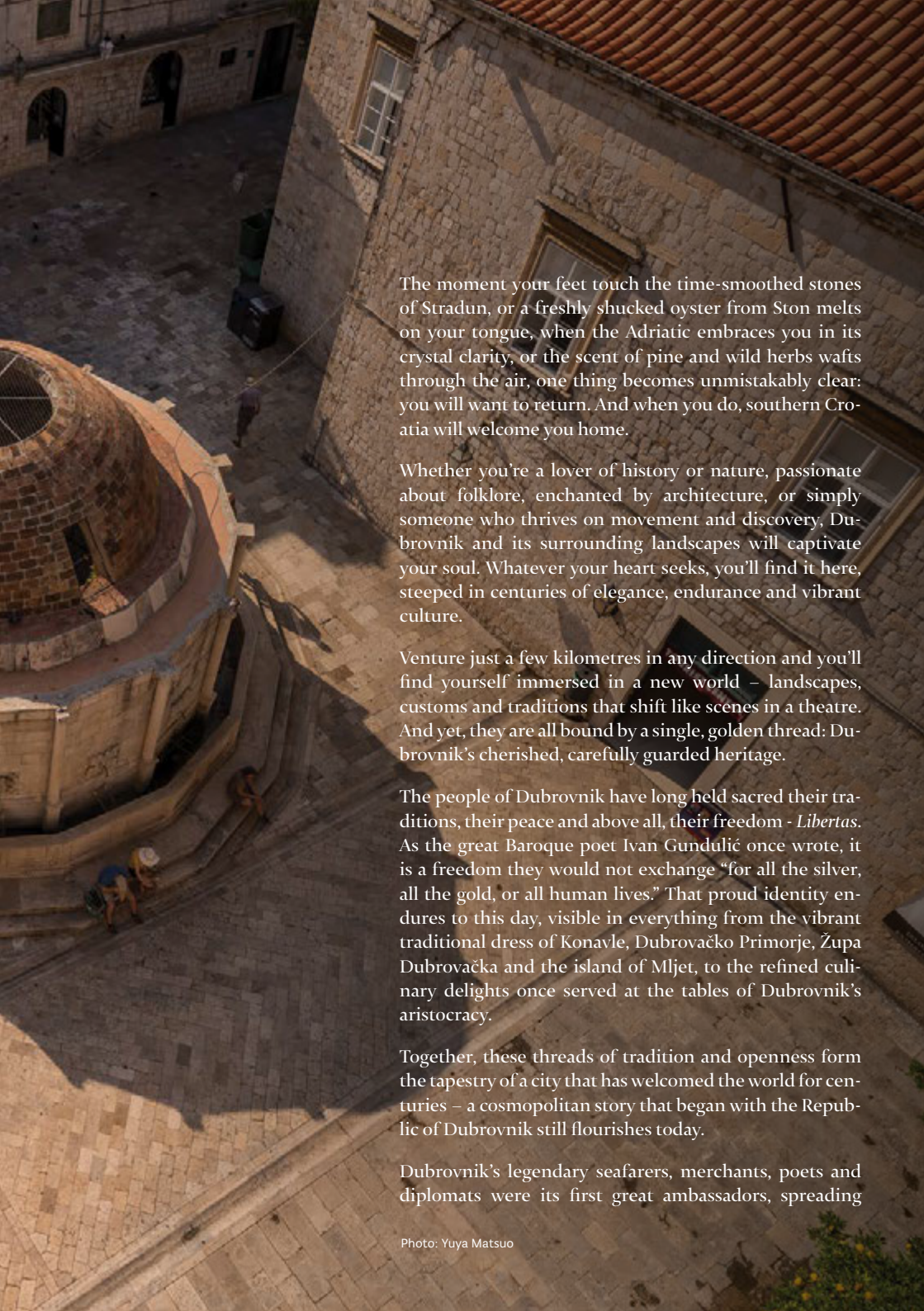

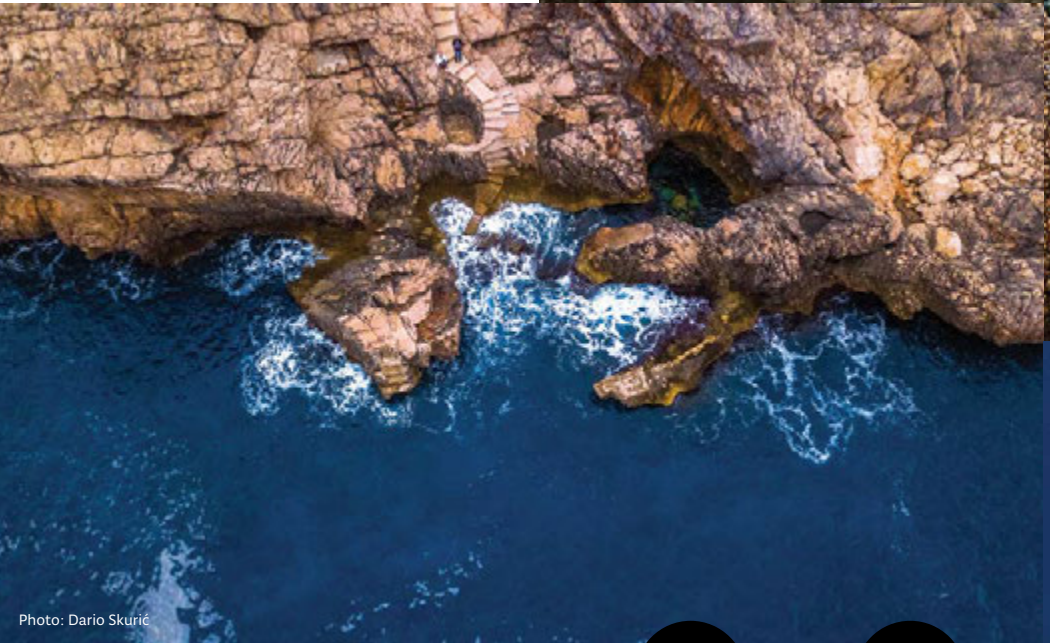

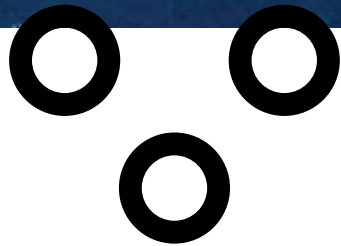

Arrival

BY PLANE



Dubrovnik Airport is located approximately 20 kilometres from the city. An official airport shuttle is available for every scheduled flight arrival, offering a direct connection to Dubrovnik. For flight departures from the airport, the shuttle bus leaves from the Main Bus Terminal in Gruž, making stops at the Grave building, in front of the Cable Car Station and in Srebreno at the One Suite Hotel.

Taxi services operate 24 hours a day.

BY CAR



Several petrol stations are available on the approach to and within Dubrovnik, with some open 24/7.

Parking

Parking is available throughout Dubrovnik, with larger public car parks located near the Old City and in key areas such as Gruž. From these locations, the historic centre is easily reached on foot or by public transport.

Limited street parking is also available **outside the restricted traffic zone surrounding the Old City**, while access within the zone is limited to residents and authorised vehicles. Visitors are advised to use designated parking areas and follow local signage carefully in order to avoid fines.

Driving restrictions around the historic Old City

The City of Dubrovnik has implemented a special Traffic Management System around the historic city centre and the immediate surrounding buffer zone, in order to protect cultural heritage and ensure sustainable urban mobility. Access by vehicle to the zone is therefore restricted and permitted only under specific conditions, as well as during special events or periods of increased traffic. Visitors are strongly encouraged to familiarise themselves with the traffic regulations in order to avoid possible fines, particularly those approaching the Old City with rental vehicles.

The zone includes the entire area surrounding the Old City, stretching from the area of Ilijina glavica, along Zagrebačka Street to Viktorija and across the areas of Pile to Boninovo. Only vehicles with special approval will be allowed to enter the zone. The zone begins at the traffic lights at the city entrance, near the public garage. From that point on, further vehicle access is limited and clearly regulated, so please take note of where vehicle access restrictions and fines for violations apply. Visitors may enter the zone only if they have arranged access in advance through one of the following:

- The Bus Web Shop – for vehicles with 7+1, 8+1, or 9-30 seats or more, with stopping permitted at the Pile and Ploče drop-off zones.
- Pre-booked parking via the official app at parking lots located below the Dubrovnik Cable Car and at Pile Gate.
- If staying in private accommodation that includes registered garage parking and the host has submitted the vehicle's license plate in advance.
- If staying in a hotel located within the restricted zone. If you are arriving in Dubrovnik with a confirmed booking at a hotel or private accommodation rental, your accommodation provider should secure and confirm a parking place for you in advance, registering your vehicle registration plate number prior to your arrival or within three days of your arrival.

If you are arriving without a prior accommodation reservation and enter the zone by vehicle in search of a place to stay, please be aware that while entry is permitted for that purpose, your stay must still be properly registered in the official system. If you do not find accommodation, you will not be able to register your stay, as official registration requires confirmation from an authorised accommodation provider and you are not entitled to remain with your vehicle within the zone.

If you do find accommodation after entering the zone, your hotel or private accommodation provider is required to register your stay within three days, in line with legal obligations.

If, however, you do not secure accommodation, to avoid a possible fine, you must leave the zone and send an explanation within three days of entering the zone to the following e-mail address: **zona@dubrovnik.hr**.

Your message should include your vehicle registration plate number, the date and time of your entry and a short explanation of the circumstances. The City Administration will then assess your case and act accordingly.

We strongly advise all visitors to book accommodation in advance and to confirm with their host whether access to the protected zone and parking arrangements can be secured prior to arrival.

BY BOAT



Dubrovnik maintains excellent ferry and catamaran connections with other Croatian ports and with Bari, Italy. Regular daily boat services also link Dubrovnik with the nearby islands of Koločep, Lopud, Šipan, and Mljet, and seasonally, with Korčula and Lastovo.

The main harbour is in Gruž, serving as the hub for all national and international maritime routes. A smaller port, located in the Old City, offers boat lines to Lokrum Island, Mlini, Srebreno and Cavtat.

In the Gruž Harbour, travellers will find the ferry ticket offices, banks, ATMs, exchange offices, parking, grocery stores, a supermarket, Srđ Department Store, the open-air green market, hotels, travel agencies, car rental services, cafés and restaurants and the Dubrovnik Tourist Board Office. The Old City is just 3 kilometres away – a 30-minute walk or a 10-minute ride on local bus lines 1A, 1B, 3 and 8.

DEPARTURES FROM THE OLD CITY PORT

→ **Boat to Lokrum Island**

The boat to Lokrum Island – a designated special nature reserve – departs every 30 minutes during the peak tourist season from the Old City Port. The ride takes approximately 10 minutes. Tickets are sold at the dockside kiosk beside the boat. The service may be suspended in bad weather.

→ **Boats to Cavtat, Mlini and Srebreno**

Throughout the tourist season, regular boat lines operate between Cavtat and the Old City Port, with stops in Mlini and Srebreno. The journey takes around 45 minutes. Service is weather-dependent.

DEPARTURES FROM THE GRUŽ HARBOUR

→ Boats to the Elaphiti Islands

Boats to the Elaphiti Islands (Koločep, Lopud and Šipan) depart from the Gruž Harbour. Timetables are available at the Dubrovnik Tourist Board TIC.

A passenger-only ferry operates four times daily, while a car ferry runs once or twice a day depending on the season.

→ Boats to Mljet Island

The island of Mljet is accessible via a fast catamaran that docks in Sobra and, during the summer, continues to Polače near the entrance to Mljet National Park.

The Jadrolinija car ferry connects Sobra with Prapratno on the Pelješac Peninsula year-round.

A fast catamaran service also connects Dubrovnik directly with Pomena, offering a convenient 75-minute journey to the heart of Mljet National Park. Operating daily from May to mid-October, this connection is ideal for day trips, allowing visitors to explore the island before returning to Dubrovnik the same afternoon.

→ Catamarans to Mljet, Korčula, Lastovo, Hvar, Brač and Split

A catamaran line operates year-round from Dubrovnik to Korčula and Lastovo while the high season brings additional fast catamarans to Mljet, Korčula, Hvar, Brač and Split.

Tickets can be purchased online at www.krilo.hr or www.tp-line.hr, or through local agents. Jadrolinija also runs a daily catamaran service from mid-June to the end of September along the Dubrovnik–Korčula–Hvar–Brač–Split route.



BY BUS

The Dubrovnik Bus Terminal is located in Gruž, near the harbour. It includes booking counters, a left-luggage office, taxi stand and kiosks. Dubrovnik is connected by daily bus lines to all major Croatian cities, in addition to international routes.

Local buses also operate from the terminal. To reach the Old City from the main bus station, take local bus line 1A or 1B, both of which depart regularly from the terminal and run directly to Pile Gate, the main entrance to Dubrovnik's historic centre.

The journey takes approximately 10 to 15 minutes, depending on traffic.

Public Bus Transport

During your stay, the most convenient way to explore Dubrovnik is by using the city's efficient public bus system. Operated by Libertas, the orange air-conditioned buses connect all city neighbourhoods with frequent regular service. Timetables are displayed at each stop and are available from hotels, the Tourist Board, or online at www.libertasdubrovnik.hr

Bus lines to surrounding areas:

→ Dubrovnik – Cavtat: Line 10

This line connects Dubrovnik with Cavtat, passing through the settlements of Srebreno, Mlini and Plat. Departures daily.

→ Dubrovnik – Župa Dubrovačka: Line 10

Line 10 also connects Dubrovnik with the settlements in Župa Dubrovačka, including Mlini and Srebreno. The journey takes about 20 minutes.

→ Dubrovnik – Ston: Line 15

Line 15 passes through Slano and Orašac on the way to Ston, known for its medieval walls and salt pans. Departs 3 times daily.

Dubrovnik – Slano: Line 12

Line 12 connects Dubrovnik with Slano, a settlement on the western coast, passing through Orašac, Tršteno and Brsečine. Departs 8 times daily.

→ Dubrovnik – Brsečine: Line 35

Line 35 connects Dubrovnik with Brsečine and passes through Zaton and Orašac. Departs 6 times daily.



Car, Scooter, Bike and Boat Rental

Numerous agencies in Dubrovnik offer rentals of cars, scooters, bicycles and boats. A rental vehicle provides an ideal way to explore Dubrovnik's surroundings at your own pace.

A valid credit card and driving licence are typically required. For motorcycles over 50 cc, a category A licence is necessary. Renting a boat requires a valid skipper's licence.

Eco-conscious travellers can opt for Mynt electric mopeds, safe, fully electric and ideal for navigating the city.

Taxi Services



Taxi stands are located in key parts of the city and are clearly marked. Fares are posted visibly and the driver is obligated to turn on the fare meter from the beginning of the ride; if not, passengers are not obliged to pay. A standard taxi accommodates up to four passengers.

For a memorable experience, you may arrange panoramic city tours or full-/half-day excursions directly with the driver. Rideshare services such as Uber and Bolt also operate throughout the Dubrovnik region.



For Yachters

With its breathtaking coastline, tranquil bays and island-dotted seascape, Dubrovnik is a paradise for sailors and yacht enthusiasts. Whether you're exploring at leisure or participating in one of the many annual regattas, Dubrovnik offers ideal sailing conditions and excellent mooring infrastructure.

The ACI Marina Dubrovnik in Komolac (Rijeka Dubrovačka) is open year-round and is one of the safest marinas in the Adriatic for berthing and vessel maintenance. It is located just 2 km from Gruž Harbour and 6 km from the Old City, offering 500 berths, including 120 dry berths, with strong bus connections to the city.

Marina Frapa Dubrovnik, located in Gruž Bay, offers 220 berths across six docks and accepts vessels up to 50 metres in length.

A limited number of berths, primarily for large yachts, are also available in Gruž Harbour. Berthing at the Orsan Sailing Club is mostly reserved for members.

ACI Marina "Veljko Barbieri" in Slano is open year-round, with 193 berths for vessels up to 50 metres. Its location provides natural protection from all winds.

Important Notice:

Upon entering Croatian territorial waters, boat captains must proceed directly to the nearest designated port of entry to complete customs clearance and pay applicable navigation fees and taxes.

In Dubrovnik, the Gruž Harbour is the year-round entry port, with seasonal border control also available in Cavtat.

A sojourn tax must be paid as a lump sum for all vessels spending nights on Croatian territory. The amount varies depending on boat size and duration of stay and can be paid online:

History



Dubrovnik through the ages: An independent city-state



Dubrovnik was added to the UNESCO World Heritage List in 1979, a recognition that celebrated the city's historic heritage and the striking architecture of its Old City core. That same year reaffirmed the global significance of Dubrovnik, underscoring the importance of preserving not only its urban and architectural achievements, but also its vibrant, living culture and heritage.

As the city evolved, so too did its surrounding areas. The earliest recorded human settlements in the region date back to Illyrian tribes, whose remnants can be found all along the coast. Notable archaeological discoveries have been made in Župa Dubrovačka – from stone axes unearthed in Dubac, the oldest evidence of human activity in the area, to burial mounds – *tumuli* and ancient tombstones. In Konavle, Illyrian mounds known as “gomile” are found in Mikulići, along with the Mithraeum in Močići and medieval tombstones – *steći* in Brotnice and at St. Barbara in Dubravka. Additional Illyrian remnants have been discovered in Dubrovačko Primorje and on the island of Mljet.

Subsequent periods of Greek and Roman control left their marks as well, visible in inscriptions carved in stone throughout the region and on its islands. These civilizations established a long-lasting presence, leaving behind a network of settlements and artefacts that still bear witness to their era.

Venetian rule also left a significant imprint on Dubrovnik's architectural identity. Before the Republic of Dubrovnik attained independence, Venice influenced not only the city's urban fabric but also its broader socio-political and mercantile structures. These ties continued even after Dubrovnik gained independence from Venetian rule in the 14th century.

The Republic of Ragusa – more widely known as the Dubrovnik Republic – was officially founded in 1358, ushering in a golden era of independence and prosperity. Dubrovnik's renowned diplomacy played a pivotal role during this time, facilitating communication with major powers, including the Ottoman Empire, even before the Ottomans had expanded into the surrounding regions. The Ragusans navigated a complex relationship with their powerful rival, the Venetian Republic, with great tact and prudence.

Despite lacking a formal military, Dubrovnik operated as an independent state for nearly 450 years. Its strength lay in maritime trade, particularly its monopoly on salt, a highly prized commodity. The Republic maintained a mercantile fleet numbering in the hundreds, rivalling the largest fleets of the period. In the 16th century, the town of Slano boasted a fleet of 32 ships and two shipyards, while the port of Cavtat also played a significant role in supporting the Republic's maritime activities.

Shipbuilding was a vital industry, as were the trade routes and economic networks that ensured the Republic's stability. To govern effectively, the Republic established Rector's Palaces in key locations. These served as administrative centres and seats of local government. Beyond the Rector's Palace within Dubrovnik's city walls, once the official residence of the Rector, several others dotted the Republic's territory. One such example is the recently restored Rector's Palace in Slano, which was reopened to the public in 2017.

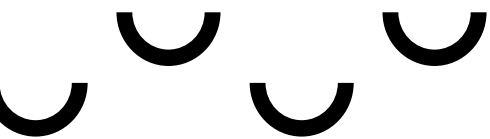

The island of Mljet was incorporated into the Republic in 1410, following the annexation of Dubrovačko Primorje. In 1426, Konavle also became part of the Republic, providing essential agricultural and trade goods to the city.

Despite its political sophistication and economic strength, Dubrovnik could not withstand the force of nature. In 1667, the city was devastated by a massive earthquake, followed by a catastrophic fire. The destruction was immense - thousands of lives were lost, buildings were razed and the city was nearly annihilated. The disaster struck during the politically fraught Cretan War, as both the Venetian Republic and the Ottoman Empire vied for control of the region. Through diplomatic agility, however, Dubrovnik managed to preserve its sovereignty and rebuild its structures.

Throughout the 18th century, Dubrovnik re-established its merchant fleet and regained a key role in Mediterranean maritime trade. Yet it never returned to the heights of economic prosperity it had enjoyed before the Great Earthquake. Political shifts across Europe and the loss of trade privileges with the Ottoman Empire, coupled with the rise of new commercial powers, contributed to the city's gradual decline.

The end of the Dubrovnik Republic came in the early 19th century with the arrival of Napoleon's forces. Acting on the orders of French General Auguste de Marmont, the Senate of the Dubrovnik Republic was officially dissolved on January 31, 1808. Thus, Dubrovnik also faced the wider fate of Croatian territories under foreign rule.

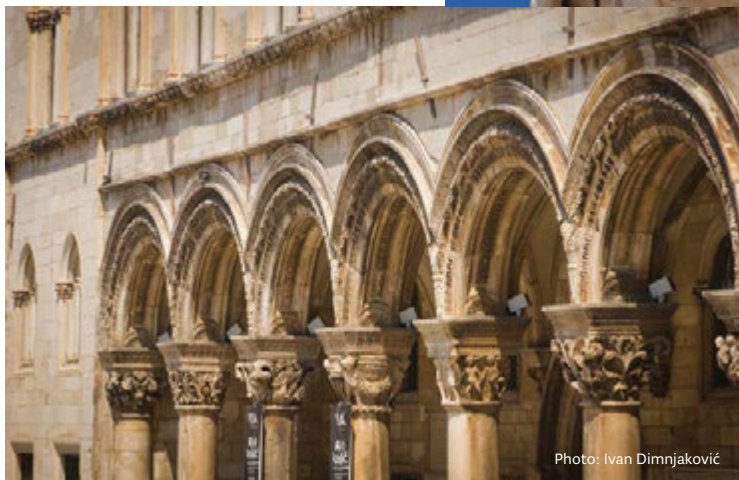

Despite these transformations, Dubrovnik's cultural legacy continued to shine, particularly during the 19th and 20th centuries, when it played an influential role in the standardization of the Croatian language. Contributions to literature and linguistics are abundant, from the Glagolitic script discovered in Župa Dubrovačka in 2007, the second-longest of its kind in Croatia, to the enduring works of prose and poetry by Dubrovnik writers. The literary works of Marin Držić and Ivan Gundulić had a lasting impact, particularly their use of the "štokavian" dialect, which ultimately became the foundation of the modern Croatian standard. The Dubrovnik variant of this dialect and its accompanying literary heritage remain invaluable contributions to the evolution of the Croatian language.

Yet Dubrovnik's past also includes a darker chapter, its experience during the Homeland War. In October 1991, shortly after Croatia declared independence, the city was attacked. Despite its UNESCO status, the Old City came under heavy artillery fire during the Serbo-Montenegrin aggression. Dubrovnik and its surroundings were occupied, bombed and plundered. The city endured an eight-month siege, with long periods without water or electricity and housed more than 21,000 refugees fleeing nearby conflict zones.

Ultimately, Croatia and with it, Dubrovnik, emerged victorious. The strength, dignity and resilience shown by the city and its citizens during the war stand as a powerful testament to the enduring spirit of liberty - "Libertas" - that has defined Dubrovnik for centuries. Once again, the city wove its name into the historical fabric of Europe and the world.

Dubrovnik

Dubrovnik doesn't just dazzle, it reveals itself, layer by sunlit layer. Step through Pile Gate and into the Old City, where stone streets glisten underfoot and baroque facades glow in the Adriatic light. The Stradun, the city's polished main street, hums with life and lavender, framed by churches, palaces and the scent of salt on the breeze.

The City Walls offer Dubrovnik's finest perspective: rooftops stretching down to the sea, framed by fortresses and forested islands. The meticulously preserved Sponza Palace and Rector's Palace speak of diplomacy and independence, while the Franciscan Monastery still houses an operating pharmacy dating to 1317.

On the top of Mount Srđ, the Homeland War Museum, housed inside the historic Fort Imperial, tells of the city's siege and survival in the early 1990s. The view from here, over terracotta roofs and deep-blue sea, is unforgettable.

Take to the water: ferries from the Old Port lead to Lokrum Island, where peacocks roam and a salt lake invites a quiet swim. Back in town, Banje Beach offers glamour, while the more offbeat Šulić and Danče beaches promise hidden serenity.

Beyond the walls, the Lapad neighbourhood provides pine-shaded paths and sea-view cafés, while Gruž is fast becoming Dubrovnik's culinary soul. In July and August, the Dubrovnik Summer Festival transforms the city into a stage, where music, theatre and dance are on show every night.



City Walls and Fortresses

The Dubrovnik City Walls are one of the best-preserved fortification systems in Europe and the city's most famous attraction. Stretching 1,940 metres, the walls include five fortresses and 16 towers and bastions and are open to visitors throughout the year. Entrances are located near St. Luke's Church, St. Saviour's Church by the Large Onofrio Fountain, and St. John's Fortress near the Maritime Museum. Three fortresses are integrated into the walls – Minčeta, Bokar and St. John's – while Lovrjenac Fortress (St. Lawrence) and Revelin Fortress stand separately outside the defensive system. Minčeta Fortress, located at the highest point of the city, once protected Dubrovnik from attacks from the north and remains a symbol of the city's defence. The Croatian flag flies from its top, alongside the Libertas flag during the Dubrovnik Summer Festival.

In the southwest corner of the city stands the Bokar Fortress, built in the 16th century to defend the western entrance and harbour area. Today it houses a collection of historic stone fragments. St. John's Fortress, constructed in 1346, protected the harbour. A huge chain was once stretched across the harbour entrance from this fortress every night to prevent enemy ships from entering. Today the building houses the Maritime Museum and the city aquarium. Nearby lies the Porporela stone pier, a beloved meeting place and swimming spot at the edge of the Old Harbour. At the eastern entrance to the town stands Revelin Fortress, surrounded by an ancient moat (now dry) and connected to the city by a stone bridge. Today it serves as a concert venue for the Dubrovnik Summer Festival and the Dubrovnik Symphony Orchestra, while the interior is home to the famous Culture Club Revelin nightclub.

St. Lawrence's Fortress – Lovrjenac

Lovrjenac Fortress rises dramatically on a 37-metre high cliff west of the Old City. Known as a symbol of Dubrovnik's independence, it defended the city from attacks from the sea. Above its entrance is the famous inscription: NON BENE PRO TOTO LIBERTAS VENDITUR AURO – “Freedom is not to be sold for all the gold in the world.” Today Lovrjenac hosts one of the main stages of the Dubrovnik Summer Festival, internationally known as one of the best locations in the world for performances of Shakespeare's Hamlet.

Stradun

Stradun, also known as Placa, is Dubrovnik's main street and central public space. Stretching between Pile Gate and Ploče Gate, it divides the Old City into northern and southern sections. The street was created in the 12th century, when a narrow sea channel separating two settlements was filled in. At the western entrance stands the Large Onofrio Fountain, built in 1438 by architect Onofrio della Cava, who designed Dubrovnik's historic water supply system. At the eastern end stands the Small Onofrio Fountain beside the Bell Tower, built in 1444. The tower's bronze figures, known as Maro and Baro (the Green Men), strike the bell every hour. Nearby stands the elegant Sponza Palace, a Gothic-Renaissance building that once housed customs offices and the state treasury. Today it is home to the Dubrovnik State Archives, one of the most important historical archives in Europe. In front of the palace stands the Orlando Column, erected in 1418, symbolizing Dubrovnik's independence.

Historic Squares

Dubrovnik's Old City is dotted with historic squares. Marin Držić Square, near the Cathedral, leads toward the Old Harbour and the Karmen district. It is named after Dubrovnik's famous Renaissance playwright. Gundulić Square, named after Baroque poet Ivan Gundulić, hosts the city's daily open-air market where farmers from nearby villages sell fresh produce. A monumental Baroque staircase, designed in 1738, leads to Ruđer Bošković Square, where the Jesuit Church of St. Ignatius and the historic Jesuit College form one of the finest Baroque complexes in Dalmatia.

Churches and Monasteries

Among Dubrovnik's most important religious buildings is the Church of St. Blaise, dedicated to the city's patron saint and built in 1715 in Baroque style. At the western end of Stradun stands the Church of St. Saviour, constructed in 1520 after the city survived an earthquake. Remarkably, this church was one of only a few buildings that survived a much more devastating earthquake in 1667.

The Franciscan Monastery is home to one of the oldest pharmacies in Europe, founded in 1317 and still operating today. The Dubrovnik Cathedral, rebuilt in the early 18th century,

houses a rich treasury of artwork including a painting by Titian. According to legend, an earlier cathedral on this site was funded by Richard the Lionheart after he survived a shipwreck near Lokrum Island in 1192. The Dominican Monastery, one of the largest Gothic buildings on the Croatian coast, contains valuable artworks and manuscripts, including a Bible from the 11th century.

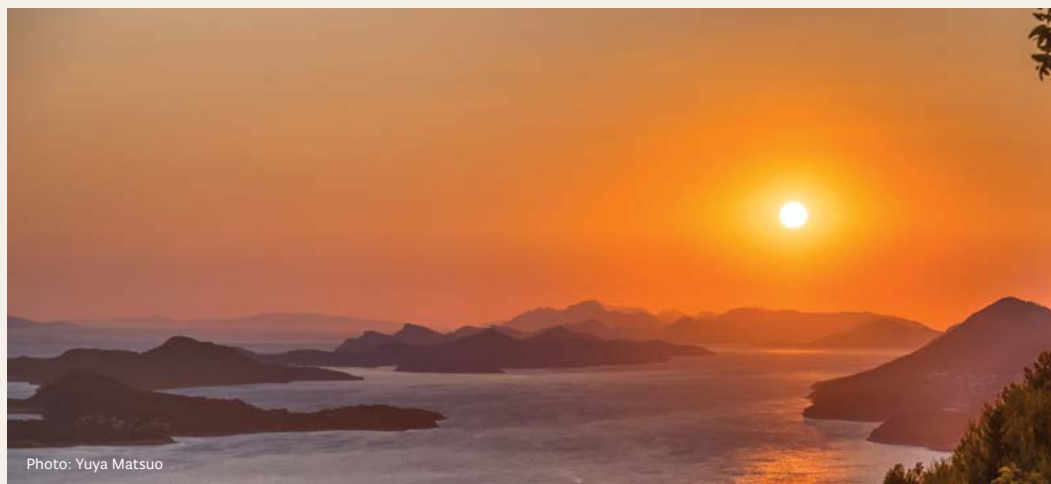

The Elaphiti Islands

The Elaphiti Islands are a group of 13 islands northwest of Dubrovnik, including the three main islands of Koločep, Lopud and Šipan. They were part of the Dubrovnik Republic from the 11th century until its fall in 1808. Today they are popular day-trip destinations, known for sandy beaches, historic churches and traditional Dalmatian cuisine. Highlights include Šunj Beach on Lopud, historic churches on Koločep, and the Skočibuha summer villa on Šipan. Ferries depart daily from Gruž harbour.

Mount Srd and the Cable Car

Rising 415 metres above Dubrovnik, Mount Srd offers spectacular panoramic views of the Old City and surrounding islands. Visitors can reach the summit by cable car, taxi or hiking trail. At the top stands Fort Imperial, which now houses a museum dedicated to the 1991-1995 Homeland War. The cable car, first built in 1969 and rebuilt after the war, connects the Old City with the summit in just a few minutes.

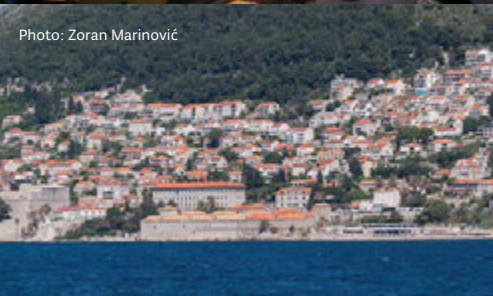

Old City Harbour

The Old Harbour was designed largely by Dubrovnik architect Paskoje Miličević in the 15th century. A stone breakwater known as Kaše protects the harbour from waves and attacks. At night a chain was once stretched across the harbour entrance from St. John's Fortress to block enemy ships. Today the harbour remains one of Dubrovnik's most picturesque locations and a reminder of the city's powerful maritime history.

Lazareti Complex

The Lazareti near Ploče Gate form one of the best preserved quarantine complexes in the Mediterranean. Built between 1627 and 1647, they protected Dubrovnik from infectious diseases arriving by sea. Today the complex serves as a creative cultural hub, hosting exhibitions, concerts and performances.

Cavtat Konavle

Konavle whispers with the rhythms of nature: rustling cypress trees, murmuring streams and the soft clink of vineyard tools. This lush southern tip of Croatia, stretching from Sniježnica Mountain to the Adriatic, is a tapestry of tradition, where olive trees, grapes and folklore coexist in timeless harmony.

Start in Cavtat, an idyllic harbour of palm-fringed promenades and terracotta rooftops. Visit the Vlaho Bukovac House art museum, explore galleries, or dine by the bay. Climb to the Račić Mausoleum and visit its white stone chapel, where the views stretch to Dubrovnik and beyond.

Head inland to Čilipi, where Sunday folklore dances and the Konavle County Museum reveal living traditions of silk, embroidery and music. Inland agrotourism estates offer local wine, meats, liqueurs and olive oil fresh from the press.

High above, Sokol Grad, a medieval fortress, watches over the valley, while Sniježnica's hiking trails lead to alpine meadows with Adriatic views. For adventure, cycle through the vineyards or ride horses along wooded paths. At the old Ljuta River mill, wheels still turn, echoing centuries past. Konavle is where heritage and landscape embrace in quiet beauty.

Župa Dubrovačka

Tucked between Dubrovnik and Cavtat, Župa Dubrovačka is a quiet stretch of coastline where life slows and the sea shimmers. The seaside villages of Mlini, Srebreno and Plat offer simple pleasures, sun-warmed stone and Adriatic charm without the crowds.

Mlini is poetic: stone quays, rushing streams and old watermills that gave the village its name. In nearby Srebreno, a wide beach and tree-lined promenade invite lazy afternoons and sunset strolls. Plat is even more peaceful, ideal for long swims, cliffside naps and candlelit dinners by the sea.

Venture inland and you'll find hillside trails, chapels among olive trees and views that sweep across the coast. The Church of St. Hilarius in Mlini is a baroque gem, while rustic paths from Petrača lead down through forest and vineyard to the glittering sea.

Markets overflow with sun-ripened tomatoes and local wine. Restaurants focus on freshness: black risotto, grilled fish and glasses of chilled local wine. If you're lucky, you might stumble on a klapa vocal concert or fishermen's night under the stars.

Close to Dubrovnik, yet a world apart, Župa Dubrovačka is the kind of place where you come to exhale and never quite want to leave.

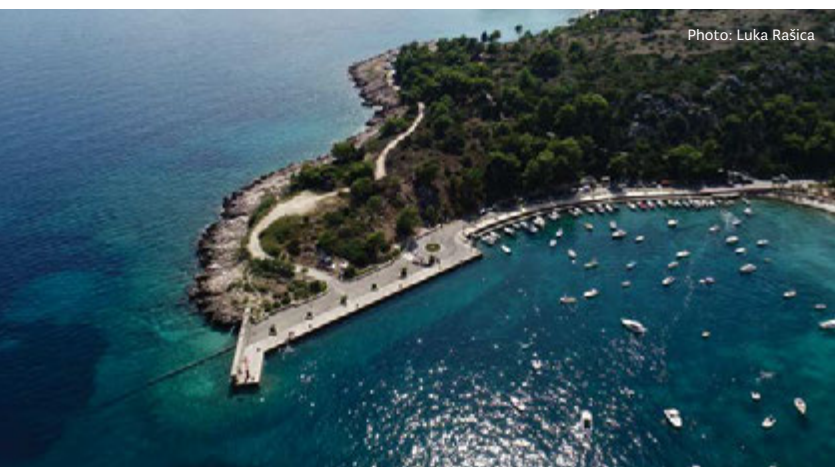

Dubrovačko Primorje

Tucked away just northwest of Dubrovnik, Dubrovačko Primorje offers a gentler, quieter Croatia. This under-the-radar coastal stretch is a mosaic of olive groves, hidden coves, sleepy villages and sun-bleached chapels – ideal for those seeking authenticity over spectacle.

Begin in Slano, the region's heart, where green hills cradle a calm bay dotted with boats. Once a retreat for Dubrovnik's nobles, elegance echoes in its churches and the 17th century Rector's Palace, now a beautifully restored cultural site. Nearby, the Heritage House of Dubrovačko Primorje showcases local crafts, music and customs, an intimate museum preserving rural life with care.

Inland, villages like Banja and Grgurići offer snapshots of Dalmatian tradition, grapevines, gardens and evening light. Scattered further afield, hamlets such as Majkovi and Imotica feel timeless. Listen to the silence, find chapels behind cypresses and discover *stećci*, medieval tombstones carved with mysterious symbols, part of a UNESCO World Heritage listing.

Follow old Napoleonic roads through wild valleys, or find unnamed beaches near Banići, shaded by pines and fig trees. Here, culture lives in the small details, baroque churches, summer festivals and songs sung beneath the stars. In Dubrovačko Primorje, nothing is staged, only quietly, beautifully real.

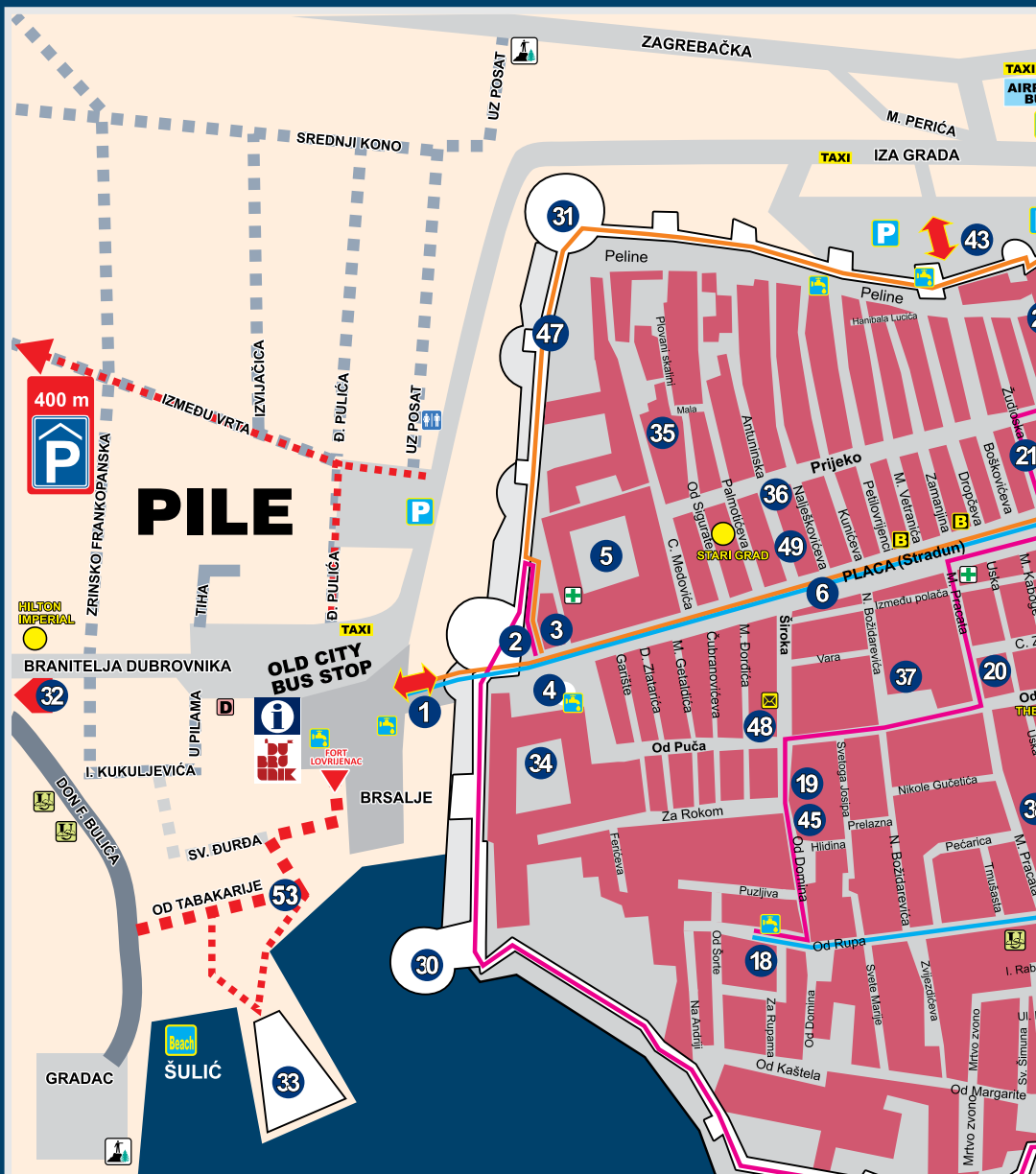
Mljet Island

Mljet is the Adriatic's most mysterious island – remote, green and shrouded in myth. Said to be the place where Odysseus was held by Calypso, this forested escape whispers instead of shouts. Here, pine-scented trails, saltwater lakes and silence reign.

The western third of the island is Mljet National Park, a sanctuary of calm. Two shimmering lakes, the Great and Small Lakes, stretch beneath pine-covered hills, their waters turning from turquoise to ink with the sun. Cycle the shaded paths, kayak at dawn, or take a boat to St. Mary's Island, where a 12th century Benedictine monastery now hosts a quiet café under the trees.

Venture east and life slows further. In Babino Polje, stone homes and vegetable gardens cling to the hillside. To the south lies Sapljunara, one of Dalmatia's rare sandy beaches, golden and fringed with pine. In the north, Okuklje offers serene sunsets, fresh seafood and the warm company of local fishermen.

The island's pristine interior invites hikers to Montokuc or along forested ridges. Blace Bay, a hidden lagoon near Sapljunara, rewards explorers with solitude and stunning shallows. Scattered ruins, Roman – Illyrian – monastic, whisper a long, quiet history. Nights end with wine by the sea, beneath a canopy of stars.

Dubrovnik: A City of Living Tradition

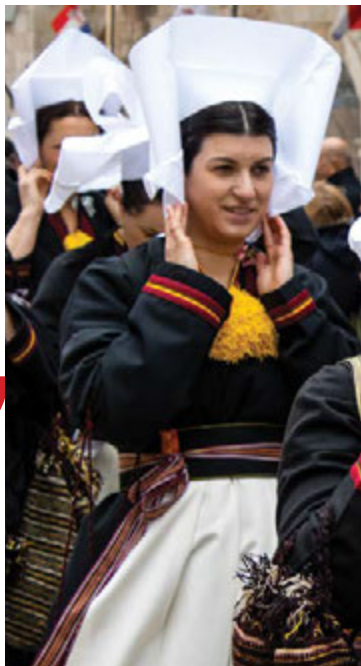

Preserving Our Heritage through Festivals and Folklore



There are many cities with beautiful facades and charming piazzas and then there are places like Dubrovnik, where heritage radiates from every stone. Here, tradition is not a thing of the past, but a lived and loved reality. To walk through this city is to trace the footsteps of centuries; to stay here is to become part of a cultural tapestry woven with reverence and celebration.

The most vivid expression of this cultural continuum arrives every year on February 3, when Dubrovnik bursts into pageantry for the Festivities of Saint Blaise, its beloved patron saint. It is a day when the city's ancient soul reveals itself. Honoured by UNESCO as Intangible Cultural Heritage, this celebration reaches beyond liturgical formality into the deepest corners of civic identity and historical pride. From early morning to nightfall, the old town is transformed into a living theatre: musket-bearing “trombunjeri” thunder in salute, crimson-and-gold banners flutter and locals don traditional finery passed down through generations.

Children carry miniature flags, women pin flowers into their hair and the air is laced with the scent of warm bread being blessed for the feast.

Saint Blaise is everywhere. His image is carved into the stonework of palaces, etched into the seals of Dubrovnik's Republic, perched atop fountains and churches and even embossed onto the city flag. Villages throughout the region bear his name on chapels and in folk songs. It is not just reverence for a saint, but for a protector who is believed to have saved the city from sieges, plagues and storms.

Preserving this living history is no small feat, but the people of Dubrovnik do so with unwavering devotion. Leading the charge is Lindo, the region's premier folklore ensemble and a cultural institution with few equals in Croatia. For over half a century, Lindo has performed regularly in the picturesque vaults of Lazareti, Dubrovnik's medieval quarantine complex turned creative haven. Every summer, their spirited choreographies and rich harmonies become a key part of the Dubrovnik Summer Festival. With more than 100 national costumes in their collection, from practical working garments to sumptuous ceremonial outfits, Lindo is not just preserving tradition – they are bringing it to life.

But the guardians of Dubrovnik's folklore extend far beyond Lindo. Across Konavle, Župa Dubrovačka, Mljet Island and the rural stretches of Dubrovačko Primorje, cultural and arts societies work year-round to uphold the customs of their ancestors. In the village of Čilipi, the Culture and Art Society Čilipi has kept Sunday folklore performances alive since 1967, inviting audiences to witness dances, songs and rituals rooted in the rhythms of agricultural life. Each community contributes its own thread to the regional tapestry, with groups like 'Marko Marojica' in Župa Dubrovačka and 'Natko Nodilo' on Mljet Island ensuring that both the spirit and the artistry of the past remain firmly in the present.

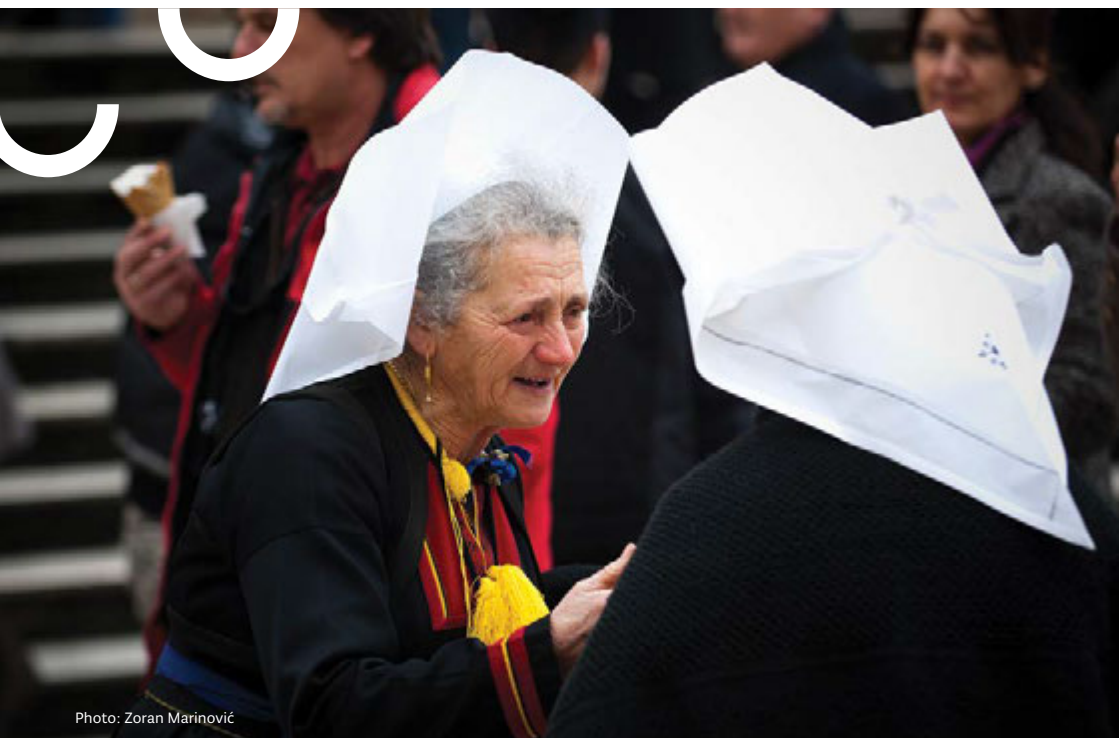

For these communities, traditional costume is more than decorative attire – it is storytelling in textile. A woman's dress might signify her marital status, her village, or even her mood. Embroidery is especially telling and none more so than that of Konavle and Mljet Island. Konavle silk threads, hand-dyed and delicately stitched, once marked a young girl's readiness for marriage and today they appear on everything from modern fashion accessories to cherished souvenirs.

Jewellery, too, holds profound meaning. Many of the designs worn today date back to the time of the Dubrovnik Republic and remain unchanged – evidence of a culture that honours its roots. The gold *kolarin* necklaces of Župa Dubrovačka and Dubrovačko Primorje gleam with stately simplicity, while Konavle's intricate *verižice* and earrings reflect exceptional craftsmanship. On the island of Mljet, distinctive pieces such as the *gradaše* earrings, *kolarin*, and the snake-shaped *zmijar* ring carry a more symbolic, almost mythic character.

Yet Dubrovnik's heritage is not confined to fabric and gold. Its spiritual life breathes in carols sung by candlelight on Christmas Eve, in songs that echo through alleyways on New Year's Eve and in melodies that rise from stone courtyards during local festivals. These carols, inscribed in the Croatian Registry of Cultural Property, are more than music. They are hymns to identity, passed down through generations and still sung with the same sincerity that once filled the city in the 15th century.

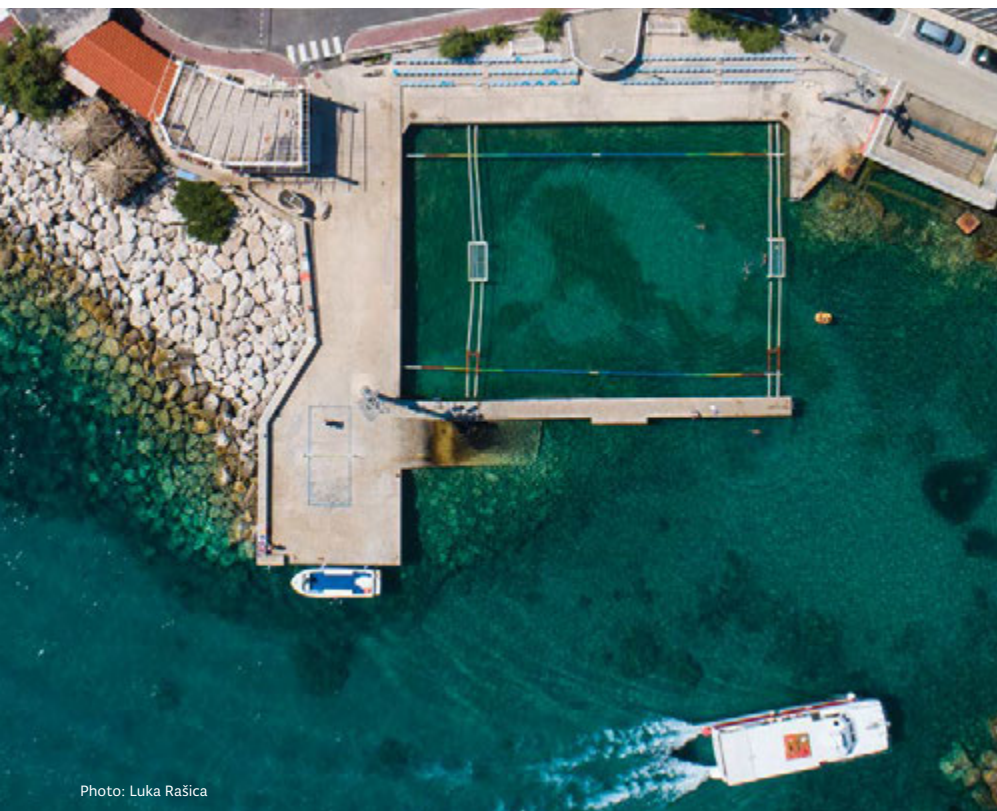

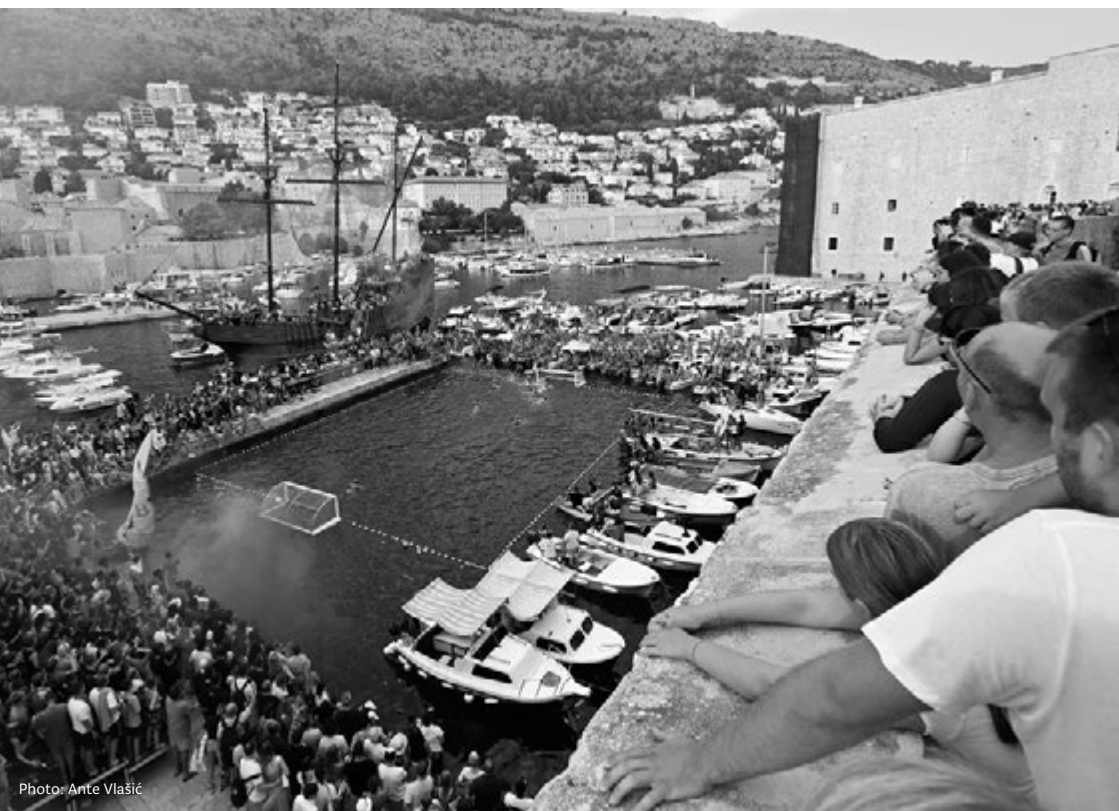

And then there is the sea, always the sea. The famed Wild League, Dubrovnik's fiercely beloved amateur water polo tournament, is not just a sporting event but a civic ritual. Played on sun-drenched beaches with the dramatic final match held in the Old Port, it draws locals of all ages and skill levels. Many of the city's professional athletes have taken part, diving in beside their neighbours, uniting competition with community. The prestigious Jug water polo club, the most decorated in Croatia, stands as a symbol of the city's ongoing commitment to excellence and pride in its unique sporting culture.

In Dubrovnik, tradition is not something to be re-enacted for tourists. It is lived. It is worn in the folds of embroidered skirts, sung on feast days, played in the waters of the Adriatic and protected fiercely through time. To visit here is not just to observe the past, but to join it, however briefly, in its continued unfolding. And as the banners rise for Saint Blaise and the songs echo across the city walls, it becomes clear: this is not a place where heritage sleeps in silence. Here, it sings.

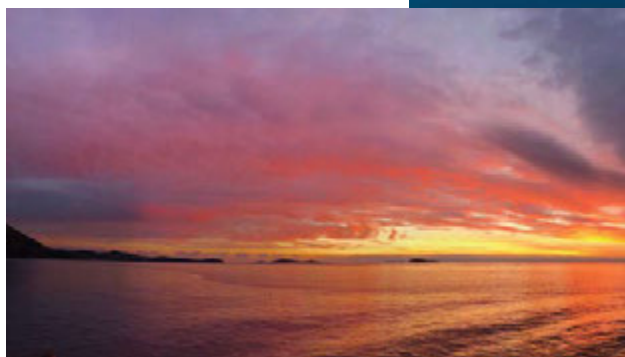

The Beauty of Nature

‘Will the eternal paradise be more beautiful than this one of mine?’



Discovering such a remarkable level of biodiversity within a relatively small geographical area is a rarity on a global scale – but this is precisely what defines the southernmost part of Croatia. This region is home to a wealth of endemic plant and animal species, flourishing across land and sea, creating a vibrant, living mosaic of natural heritage.

A shining example of this exceptional biodiversity and geodiversity is the island of Mljet. Covering just over 100 square kilometres, the island is home to areas designated as significant landscapes, parts of the Natura 2000 ecological network and most notably, a national park, Croatia's highest level of environmental protection. Mljet Island National Park spans 5,375 hectares and was established in 1960, making it the oldest marine park in the Mediterranean. Often referred to as “the most forested island in the Adriatic,” Mljet owes this title to its dense Aleppo pine forests, which cover 90% of the park's surface. The park's protected status is rooted in the richness of its ecosystem, which supports a diverse range of native flora and fauna. Experience the natural beauty of this island at the Great and Small Lakes, sandy coves, freshwater springs, salt-water inlets and subterranean geological features such as caves, caverns and sinkholes, home to many rare and endemic species.

Likewise, just off the coast of Dubrovnik lies the lush island of Lokrum, a designated nature reserve and a cherished day-trip destination for both locals and visitors. Despite its popularity, Lokrum remains a sanctuary of unspoiled nature. Nearby, Rijeka Dubrovačka and the Trsteno Arboretum have witnessed centuries of harmonious interaction between people and the environment, where cultivated landscapes blend seamlessly with architectural heritage and protected natural features. The Trsteno Arboretum, considered one of the oldest examples of landscape architecture in Europe, continues this tradition. Its entrance is guarded by majestic plane trees over five centuries old.

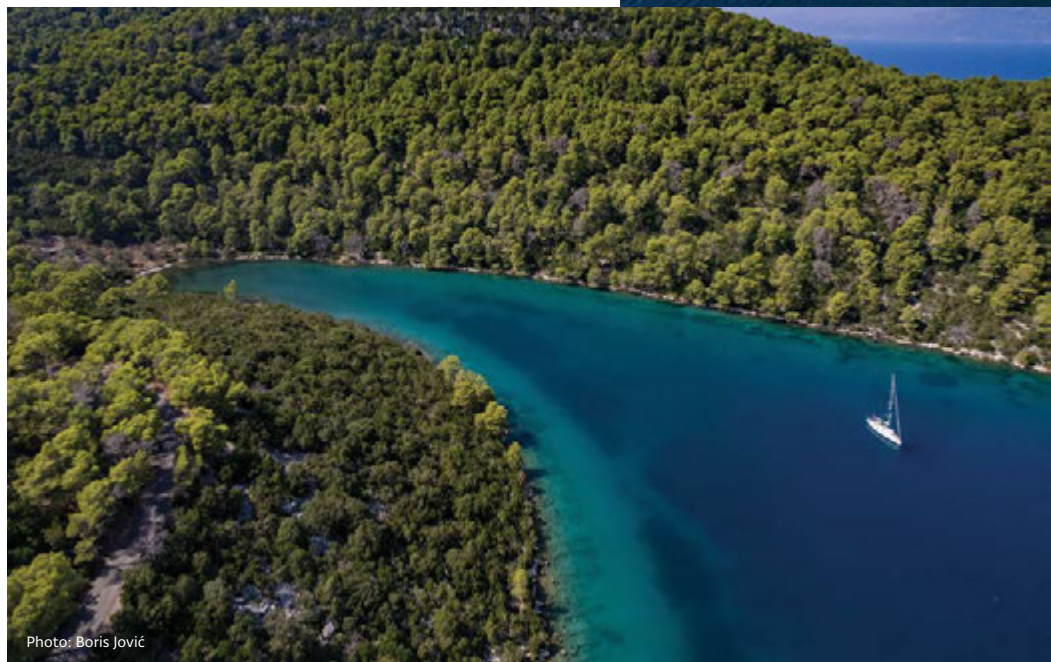

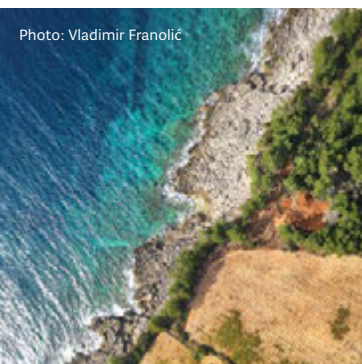
The summer villas of Dubrovnik, perched along the banks of Rijeka Dubrovačka, offer another vivid example of this bond. Set near the source of the Ombla River, one of the shortest yet most biodiverse rivers in the world, these villas reflect the long-standing respect for nature among Dubrovnik's nobility. Dubrovačko Primorje, a region of just over 2,000 residents scattered across 20 picturesque villages, stands as a haven of pristine tranquillity. The Bay of Mali Ston, part of the Natura 2000 network, is a protected marine area of international importance. This protection extends to Bay of Župa Dubrovačka and much of Konavle, affirming the region's ecological significance. The Adriatic Sea here is not only rich in biodiversity but also in bio-productivity, particularly in shellfish cultivation. Mariculture and nature coexist gracefully, exemplified by the shellfish hatchery in Bistrina, which has become a model of sustainable aquaculture.

The mainland is no less captivating. The landscape bursts with citrus groves, palms, holm oaks and medicinal Mediterranean herbs – broom, heath, myrtle and many others. Among the fauna, the Herpetological Reserve of the Majkovi turtle and the pond in Majkovi stand out as unique natural treasures.

Croatia's southernmost river, the Ljuta, winds its way through the fertile Konavle valley. Joined by the Konavoćica stream, it nourishes the verdant Konavle fields. The Ljuta is teeming with life, just like the dramatic cliffs of Konavle, which rise majestically above the region. Towering above them all is Sniježnica, the southernmost peak of the Dinaric Alps, richly carpeted with aromatic and healing herbs. Cypress trees dot the rolling hills, creating the iconic landscape of Konavle and serving as enduring symbols of the region.

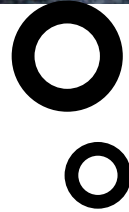
Together, Župa Dubrovačka and Konavle form a natural amphitheatre around the Bay of Župa, an area renowned for its ornithological reserves. The islands of Mrkan, Bobara and Supetar provide critical nesting grounds for yellow-legged gulls and other seabirds, ensuring the continued vitality of local birdlife.

The region's climate, geographic position and ecological wealth weave an intricate tapestry of natural beauty. It is no surprise that the great Dubrovnik writer Ivo Vojnović once pondered: "Will the eternal paradise be more beautiful than this one of mine?" In the landscapes of southern Dalmatia, one begins to understand exactly what he meant.





Eating Locally



In Dubrovnik, food is not merely nourishment, it is memory, ritual and identity. The region's cuisine, shaped by centuries of maritime trade, cultural fusion and deep-rooted local customs, is a living chronicle of flavour. Here, every meal tells a story, of seafaring ancestors, sunny gardens, festive tables and sacred traditions passed down through generations.

Centuries ago, Dubrovnik's sailors returned home not just with tales of distant shores, but with new ingredients, aromatic herbs and culinary inspiration. These worldly flavours were lovingly folded into the region's traditional recipes, birthing a gastronomy that is at once refined and rustic. Today, this legacy lives on in dishes that blend sophistication with comfort, like the beloved *šporki makaruli*, a rich, slow-cooked beef ragout spooned over handmade pasta, served during grand celebrations and intimate Sunday lunches.

The Republic never turned its back on global influences. Black risotto, stained with squid ink and bursting with briny depth; *pašticada*, a beef dish marinated in wine and spices, slowly braised until tender; and the classic Mediterranean trinity – grilled fish, seasonal vegetables and golden olive oil – are staples that graced both aristocratic tables and coastal kitchens. Ragusans were early adopters of food trends, delighting in exotic spices and treating fruits as prized delicacies.

Fish has always been the star of the Dubrovnik table. Whether it's smelt, mullet, or tuna fit for sushi, seafood here is caught fresh and served simply. From the river Ljuta in Konavle to the salty shores of Slano, Cavtat and Mljet Island, restaurants plate up treasures from sea and stream with reverence for both ingredient and season.

Desserts, too, reflect this balance of abundance and restraint. There's *rožata*, a Dubrovnik-style crème caramel, or the earthy carob cake, based on the island's ancient trees. These were often followed by an aromatic liqueur: *rozulin* made from rose petals, or homemade infusions of cherry, walnut, or loquat. A final flourish of candied almonds - *bruštulani mjenduli* or orange peels - *arancini* rounded out the meal.

Venture inland and the culinary story deepens. In the villages of Konavle, Župa Dubrovačka and beyond, farm-to-table isn't a trend – it's a way of life. Here, meals are brought forth from the land: *peka* – free-range meats slow-roasted under iron domes, hearty *zelena menestra* with leafy greens and smoked meats, or platters of aged cheese, olives and air-dried prosciutto. In the island of Mljet's wild hinterland, foraged greens and venison yield dishes of rustic beauty and bold flavour.

By the sea, in places like Bistrina in Dubrovačko Primorje, you'll find Europe's oldest farmed delicacy, the flat oyster, *Ostrea edulis*, prized for its briny sweetness. Shellfish thrive in the pure Adriatic waters and their presence on menus is a celebration of heritage as much as a harvest.

The region's sweet offerings, often created with few ingredients but infinite care – are tiny masterpieces. Women in stone kitchens crafted quince jelly – *kontonjata*, candy made from grape must – *mantala*, airy *padišpanj* sponge cakes, *Župska simulata* made of wheat grits and almond confections like *krokanat*, crunchy and golden with sugar.

And then there is the wine. Once served only on diplomatic occasions, the noble *Malvasija Dubrovačka* is enjoying a well-deserved renaissance. This elegant white wine, light yet layered, is a soulful companion to seafood or contemplation. Across Konavle's vineyards, red varietals like merlot, cabernet sauvignon, kadarun and plavac mali express the land's sunlit intensity. Meanwhile, Mljet Island offers rare indigenous grapes – *kuljenača*, *diliper*, *mrkuša* waiting to be rediscovered.

To dine in Dubrovnik is to experience something greater than the meal itself. It is to honour the land, the sea, the heritage and the people who keep its culinary heart beating. From lavish feasts to humble hearths, each bite is a love note to a region that understands food not just as pleasure – but as poetry.



Where to Stay: Dubrovnik and Beyond

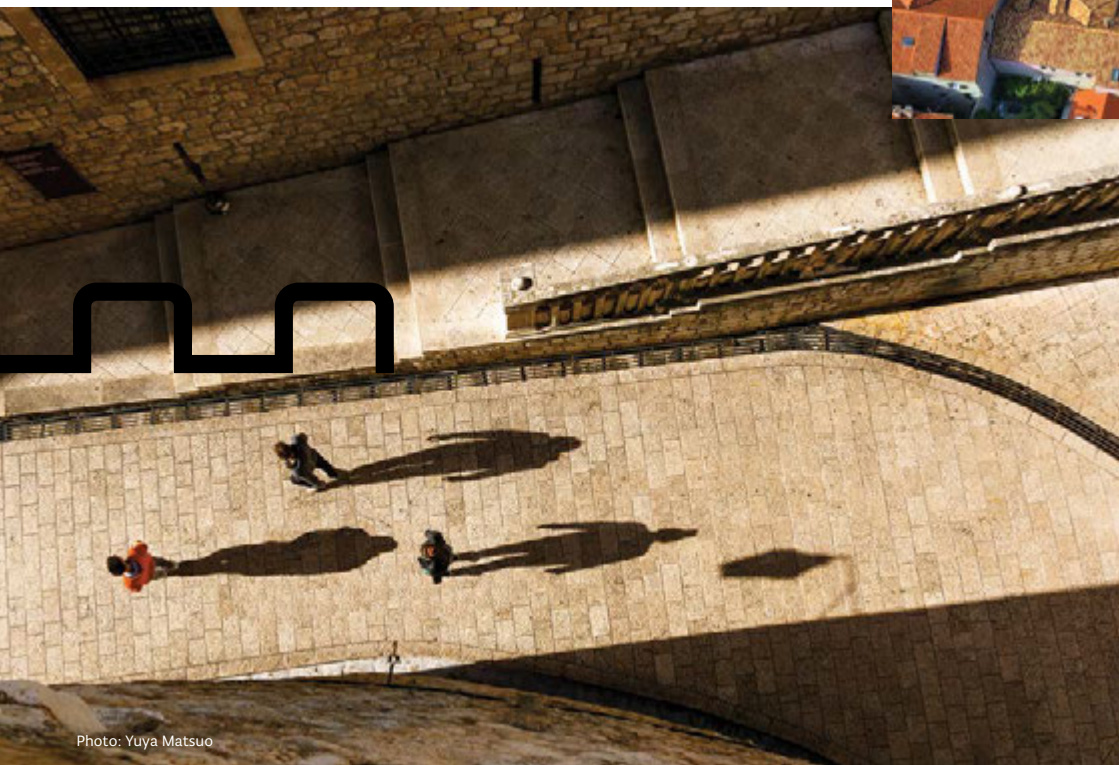

Facilities are generous and often award-winning, placing Dubrovnik hospitality firmly on the global map.

Private accommodation in Dubrovnik is a story of warmth and welcome. The generosity of local hosts has fostered a wide and vibrant offer: elegant villas, seafront apartments, countryside retreats, and cosy room rentals. Whether you're seeking the charm of a homestay, the exclusivity of a luxury villa, or the comfort of a family-run guesthouse, the options are both abundant and beautifully diverse.

The surrounding region offers its own treasures. Picturesque stone villages hide stunning rural villas and holiday homes that balance rustic charm with modern comfort. For adventurers, auto camps and campgrounds – many of them seaside – allow for immersive experiences beneath the stars, close to the sea and nature.

Nautical travellers, too, will find themselves at home. Exploring the Adriatic by boat is a dream realised in Dubrovnik's three marinas: the award-winning ACI Marina in Komolac just outside the city, the modern ACI Marina 'Veljko Barbieri' in Slano and the state-of-the-art Marina Frapa in Gruž Bay. Each provides well-equipped berths and a full suite of services, welcoming everyone from sailing enthusiasts to luxury yacht passengers.

Whether anchored in a marina, tucked away in a hillside villa, or waking to the sunrise in a coastal campsite, staying in and around Dubrovnik is always more than just a place to sleep – it's a richly woven part of the experience itself.

The Beaches of Dubrovnik and Beyond





Choosing the most beautiful beach might seem like a difficult task

From early spring through late autumn, the crystalline waters of the Adriatic remain warm and welcoming, setting the stage for an unforgettable seaside escape. Here, the only dilemma is choosing your beach: golden sands, smooth pebbles, or sculpted stone.

Begin at Banje Beach, Dubrovnik's iconic main beach with a cinematic view of the Old City walls and the forested island of Lokrum. Set beside the historic Lazareti complex – once a quarantine station, now a vibrant arts venue – Banje blends past and present in a single sun-drenched spot. To the east, St. Jacob's Beach offers a quieter atmosphere, accessed by a long staircase.

For a livelier rhythm, visit the Lapad Bay and Babin Kuk peninsulas. Here, Dubrovnik's urban beaches offer everything from stylish cocktails at Copacabana Beach to playful water sports and upscale hotel access. On Lokrum Island, nature lovers find their slice of solitude among rocky outcrops and secluded coves, surrounded by cypress trees and peacocks, as well as a secluded designated nude beach.

Those in search of serenity will fall under the spell of Šunj Beach on Lopud Island. With a crescent of soft white sand stretching gently into the turquoise shallows, it's a favourite of barefoot wanderers and families alike.

Yet Dubrovnik's coastal charms extend far beyond city limits. Scenic gems dot the shoreline like pearls: Slano, Budima in Banići and the hidden retreats of Doli, Smokvina and Sladenovići each offer a private haven where time seems to pause. The beaches of Konavle are secluded stretches of coast that feel like a Mediterranean mirage, dramatically carved into the cliffs, reached by winding coastal paths, and often recognised as some of the world's most photogenic seaside spots.

Molunat, Croatia's southernmost village, harbours a constellation of coves ideal for unplugging completely. Meanwhile, Cavtat's graceful promenade curves around a sparkling bay, lined with elegant hotel beaches that invite languid afternoons and golden-hour swims. Kupari, Mlini and Srebreno provide family-friendly beaches, shaded walks and just enough café culture to linger longer.

And then there is Mljet Island – a verdant island sanctuary where beaches feel mythic. Sapunara, with its trio of untouched sandy bays, is not only breath-taking but also a protected natural landscape. The coves of Gonoturska, Kozarica and Ropa, the latter a haven for the rare Mediterranean monk seal, complete this island's offering of pristine isolation.

Whether you seek postcard perfection, barefoot simplicity, or lavish coastal comfort, southern Croatia offers a beach for every desire. The Adriatic doesn't just bathe the shore - it elevates it into an experience, one wave at a time.



Outdoor Activities

Dubrovnik, the jewel of the Adriatic and one of the world's most celebrated travel destinations, is famed not only for its cultural landmarks and rich historical tapestry, but also for its growing reputation as a hub for adventure tourism. While its iconic medieval city walls and narrow stone streets continue to enchant history lovers, the city and its surrounding landscapes offer a vibrant invitation to travellers seeking a more active and exhilarating escape.

From cycling along dramatic coastal routes to hiking panoramic mountain trails, diving into the depths of the crystal-clear sea, riding horseback through olive groves, or revving across rugged terrain on a buggy safari, Dubrovnik promises a different kind of thrill for every curious soul. Here, heritage and adrenaline are not opposites but companions, creating unforgettable moments in a setting where nature, history and culture converge.

Biking

In the undulating countryside of Dubrovačko Primorje, history and recreation go hand-in-hand. The region's first officially marked thematic cycling route, Steći Dubrovačkog Primorja is an almost 50-kilometre journey stretching from Slano to Bistrina. Along the way, cyclists pass ancient *steći*, medieval tombstones carved with enigmatic symbols, silent witnesses to centuries gone by. Here, every push of the pedal becomes a passage through time.

While Dubrovnik's Old City, with its polished limestone alleys and throngs of visitors, may not be ideal for cycling, its surrounding landscapes open up a world of two-wheeled wonder. Whether it's a glimpse of the Elaphiti Islands, a distant view of the walled city glowing at sunset, or the scent of wild herbs wafting from dry stone terraces, the routes are thoughtfully designed to enhance, rather than disturb, the pristine natural environment. A bicycle ride with a sea view? Absolutely priceless.

In the sunny fields and gentle hills of Konavle, many trails follow old walking routes and some even repurpose former railway lines. The legendary Čiro Trail, once travelled by locomotive, now welcomes hikers and cyclists eager to explore its rich rural heritage. Winding through pine forests, olive groves and tiny hamlets, it's a favourite among both casual riders and intrepid explorers.

A popular route here begins in Čilipi and traces a scenic 25-kilometre arc through Donja Banda and across the fertile plains of Konavosko polje. Another trail, slightly longer at 26 kilometres, takes you through the highlands of Gornja Banda and descends into Cavtat, with panoramic views and cultural touchpoints along the way. For those short on time or stamina, a third, 10-kilometre route loops through the sleepy villages of Donja Banda before returning to Čilipi.

There's a particular charm to cycling through Dubrovnik's lesser-known upland villages (Gornja sela), or gliding past olive groves in Župa Dubrovačka. These rides are not about speed but serenity. Birds chirp, cicadas hum and occasionally, you'll pass a farmer's tractor or a curious donkey peering from a stone-walled enclosure. The Elaphiti Islands, accessible by boat, offer further enchantment for those wishing to combine a cycling adventure with island-hopping tranquillity.

And then there's Mljet Island, Croatia's greenest island and a cyclist's dream. Rugged, remote and shrouded in legend, this island is laced with diverse trails ranging from flat, family-friendly asphalt loops to rocky, red-dirt tracks perfect for mountain biking. Some routes are gentle; others demand grit and determination. All are unforgettable.

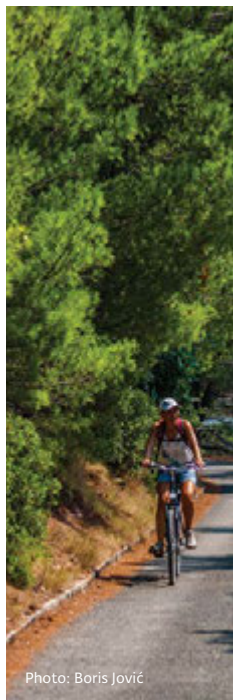

The Mljet Hiking Circuit, nearly 50 kilometres long, can be adapted for bikes and divided into four epic legs: Pomena–Govedari, Govedari–Blato, Blato–Rogovići–Babino Polje and Babino Polje–Veliki Grad–Sobra. With 20 marked checkpoints, trail stamps and panoramic pit stops, it's a pilgrimage of sorts, for nature lovers with strong calves.

Yet the most iconic ride of all may be the circular path that loops through Mljet National Park, around the ethereal Great and Small Lakes and past the Benedictine monastery that floats like a mirage in the centre. From there, routes fan out to Pomena and Polače, with shaded benches, sea breezes and intoxicating views at every turn.

Ride further south and you'll find Blato, home to a scenic loop overlooking mysterious wetlands known as *blatine*. Or explore the central highlands via the Sobra–Babino Polje–Maranovići trail, which passes olive groves, ancient chapels and secret coves where the only sound is your own breath. One not to miss is the short but spectacular route in Saplnara, where the path leads straight to a trio of golden sandy beaches – perfect for a cooling dip before the ride back.

Most of island of Mljet's routes mix asphalt with gravel, offering options for every level – from leisurely cruisers to ambitious off-roaders. Distances range from 5 to 50 kilometres and the terrain fluctuates between moderate and demanding.

Diving

The underwater world of Dubrovnik is just as captivating as its coastline and islands, as divers will readily confirm. The seabed of southern Croatia feels like an open-air museum beneath the surface, offering rich marine life alongside caves, underwater walls and exceptional visibility.

One of the most remarkable archaeological diving sites in the Adriatic can be found near Cavtat. Sometime during the 3rd century, a Roman ship carrying around 50,000 litres of oil sank here, leaving behind a vast field of amphorae. Today, more than a thousand of these ancient vessels lie preserved on the seabed. Located at a depth of around 30 metres, the site can be explored with professional guidance and remains one of the most impressive underwater heritage locations in the Mediterranean.

Further south, around the island of Mljet, diving takes on a different character. Here, the focus shifts to natural beauty: colourful reefs, dramatic underwater cliffs, caves and historic shipwrecks. Visibility often exceeds 30 metres, making the area ideal for both beginners and experienced divers.

One of the most unique sites is the wreck of the ship Teti, which sank in 1944 near Cape Ražnjić. Resting at a depth between 10 and 33 metres, it is accessible to a wide range of divers and has become home to a thriving marine ecosystem.

Within Mljet National Park, the Great and Small Lakes offer a unique diving experience, particularly in the Soline Channel, where strong currents mix salt and fresh water. The seabed here is rich with seagrass meadows, supporting octopus, lobsters, moray eels and groupers, while dolphins are occasionally spotted offshore.

Other notable locations include the waters around Župa Bay and the bay of Slano, where numerous shipwrecks from various historical periods lie beneath the surface, adding further depth to Dubrovnik's already diverse diving scene.

Hiking Trails

Though best known for its cinematic city walls, Baroque churches, and UNESCO World Heritage Old City, Dubrovnik reveals a more rugged soul when you trade limestone streets for winding mountain trails. The city and the surrounding region offer a surprising bounty of hiking routes that thread through pine forests, skirt along cliffs, scale mountains, and even traverse islands. For the curious traveller, this is Croatia at its rawest and most rewarding.

The Mala Petka trail, a two-kilometre loop that winds behind hotels and above rooftops, offers shaded serenity and views of the sea, a micro-escape in the middle of it all. The trail begins just behind Hotel Dubrovnik Palace on the Lapad peninsula, where a small path leads directly into the pine forest. To reach the starting point, take bus line number 4 (Hotel Palace) from Pile Gate or the Old City – it runs frequently and stops right outside the hotel, at the end of the route. If arriving by car, there is limited parking near the hotel entrance. The area is also accessible on foot from Lapad Bay, making it one of Dubrovnik's most convenient and rewarding short hikes.

Beyond the city, a 70-kilometre network of hiking and cycling trails connects coastal paths with quieter inland landscapes, where traditional villages and dry-stone walls bring us back to the past. The Camino

Dubrovnik stretches 145 kilometres towards Medugorje, offering a seven-day route inspired by the Camino de Santiago.

Closer to the city, the walk to Orsula viewpoint winds through Mediterranean vegetation before opening onto sweeping Adriatic views. Meanwhile, the coastal paths of Lapad provide an easy, scenic route along the shoreline, shaded by pine trees and accessible to all.

But to truly ascend, head for Mount Srđ. Towering above the Old City, this historic hill played a crucial role in Dubrovnik's defence during the Homeland War of the early 1990s. Today, it welcomes hikers via several trails that originate from the Old Town, Gruž, or Šumet. At the summit awaits Fort Imperial, home to the Homeland War Museum, as well as a panoramic overlook with views of the city and the scattered jewels of the Elaphiti Islands. It's a moderate climb, and your reward is a stunning cinematic sweep of Dubrovnik.

Speaking of Elaphiti Islands, they are home to some of the most scenic hikes in the region. On Koločep (Kalamota), the short but striking Gornje – Donje Čelo trail winds through island life, olive groves, and pine-scented breezes. For something slightly more adventurous, follow the path to Špilja Bezdanj, a sea cave that feels like a secret.



Šipan, the largest of the Elaphiti, offers the tranquil Olive Route from Sudurađ to Puhijera, immersing walkers in the rhythm of Mediterranean island life. On Lopud, the Benešin Rat trail hugs the coast, promising sea views and solitude. On the mainland, Dubrovnik's suburban neighbourhoods also reward

the wanderer. Rijeka Dubrovačka, a lush valley where freshwater meets the sea, offers paths and moderate half-day hikes.

South of the city, the trails of Župa Dubrovačka and Konavle open a world of coastal promenades, country roads, and ancient sanctuaries. The Cavtat – Močići – Čilipi trail mixes nature with history, passing Roman temples and folkloric heartlands. The Ronald Brown Path, from Obod to Velji Do, climbs high above Cavtat for a glorious vista of Dubrovnik's Riviera.

Then there's the queen of them all snowy – Sniježnica. At 1,234 metres, it is the southernmost peak of the Dinaric Alps. The name itself speaks to its frosted legacy, with snow sometimes lingering into spring. The marked trail from Mihanići or Kuna Konavoska leads through forests and open ridgelines to panoramic views.

The western countryside, known as Dubrovačko Primorje, is a hiker's playground. With the help of the new Tourist Hiking Map and a detailed online network of bike and hiking paths, you can set off with ease. The routes wind among historic waypoints and natural gems, ideal for the explorer-at-heart.

And finally, Mljet – a national park unto itself, this emerald island is laced with marked paths. The circular route around Great and Small Lakes offers a peaceful walk along saltwater lakes. Climb Montokuc for the best views in the park or take on the full 43-km Mljet Hiking Trail over multiple days. From Kneže Polje's archaeological sites to the sleepy cove of Grabova, every trail is a journey into lush green silence.

Horse Riding

Konavle is a land of quiet surprises, where heritage and wilderness meet beneath wide skies. Among its many offerings is a unique experience for equestrian lovers: a guided horseback tour that begins in the peaceful village of Popovići. Here, calm, well-trained horses and licensed guides lead the way on an unforgettable journey.

Known as the Blue Trail, the route is designed for all levels, safe and scenic for beginners, yet rewarding for experienced riders. The pace is intentionally slow, allowing every rider to soak in the beauty of the Konavle landscape, from fertile fields to olive groves, all the way to the monumental Konavoske stijene, the dramatic, protected cliffs where the land meets the sea.

Kayak & Canoe

You can rent a kayak anywhere along the Adriatic coast, but only in Dubrovnik does the paddle transform into a passport for myth and magic. Imagine drifting on the sparkling sea as ancient stone walls rise before you, Lokrum shimmers in the distance and the splash of oars meets the silence of a hidden cave. Kayaking here isn't just a water sport, it's a cinematic experience of Adriatic splendour.

There is something quietly majestic about circling Dubrovnik's UNESCO-protected Old City by kayak. At water level, the medieval battlements appear even more imposing, the waves lap gently against your small craft and the bustling city above becomes a distant murmur. The jewel-toned waters take you past the forested isle of Lokrum, where peacocks roam and legends of a monks' curse swirl in the air. And then, like a secret door in a fairy tale, you glide into the ethereal blue of Betina Cave, a secluded grotto tucked into the rocky shore just outside the city.

Kayak rental stations are dotted along the coast and most excursions are led by licensed guides who ensure every detail, from safety briefings to snug life jackets, is perfectly in place. The kayaks themselves are

top-quality and seaworthy, built for both beginners and seasoned paddlers. Depending on the season and sea conditions, guides tailor the routes, sometimes adding customized tips for independent island-hopping by paddle.

If Dubrovnik is a theatrical epic, then Župa Dubrovačka and Cavtat offer the serene haiku. Renting a kayak here allows you to trace a gentler coastline, rich in natural detail and perfect for quiet exploration. Glide through the protected waters of Župa Bay, past tiny islets covered in pine trees, where the only traffic is the darting of fish below you and the flight of gulls above. In Cavtat, the coastline tells tales of ancient Epidaurum and every cove feels like a private discovery. The area is a haven for marine flora and fauna, offering an intimate encounter with the Adriatic's biodiversity.

For those who seek not just a paddle but a pulse-quickenning plunge into nature, Mljet Island delivers. Croatia's greenest island, a vision of unspoiled wilderness and mythological charm, elevates kayaking into something more primal and profound. Here, both kayaks and canoes are available for rent, opening up a world of aquatic adventure.

Begin your journey on Great and Small Lakes, Mljet's twin saltwater lakes within the National Park. Paddling here is like slipping into a dream. Glassy waters reflect the encircling pines and centuries-old Benedictine monastery and the silence is so pure, it feels sacred. For the more adventurous, excursions continue along the island's rugged coast, weaving through tranquil coves, sea caves and secret beaches accessible only by sea.

Quad / Buggy Safari

If you're a nature lover looking for an extra thrill, set off on a quad adventure through the Dubrovnik countryside. Whether you're riding just above the city on Mount Srđ or along the scenic Konavle river Ljuta, you're guaranteed an unforgettable experience. It's especially exciting to drive quads through the picturesque villages of Župa Dubrovačka or the Dubrovačko Primorje. Don't forget to stop and take in the view, particularly during sunset, when the landscapes are bathed in golden light.

Tours and trip lengths vary depending on the agency, so be sure to choose one that suits your preferences. A Buggy Safari offers a wide range of possibilities, from off-road driving and visiting ancient fortresses to exploring sites significant to Dubrovnik's recent history during the Homeland War of the early 1990s. You can also simply enjoy the diverse plants and animals and stunning views from Mount Srđ.

For Visitors with Limited Mobility





Dubrovnik and the surrounding region offer a welcoming and inclusive environment for all travellers, with many hotels, private accommodations, public institutions and cultural landmarks thoughtfully adapted for persons with disabilities and limited mobility. Within the historic city walls, access to public and government institutions is facilitated, ensuring that the heart of Dubrovnik remains open to all.

To further improve accessibility, a wheelchair is available for rent, allowing visitors to reach the Cathedral of the Assumption of the Virgin Mary via a ramp located at the southern entrance. The Convent of St. Claire and the Dubrovnik Cable Car are fully accessible to wheelchair users, as are several other key sites, including the Aquarium, the Museum of Modern Art Dubrovnik and the Rector's Palace. Accompanied wheelchair users can also access the Franciscan Monastery of the Friars Minor and the exhibition space within the Sponza Palace. Even a visit to the breath-taking Mljet National Park is simple and convenient for visitors in wheelchairs.

Public transportation, including boat services and city buses, has been comprehensively adapted to meet the needs of those with disabilities. In addition, a range of customized guided tours is available to ensure an enriching experience for all visitors.

Multiple sea-access chair lifts are positioned throughout Dubrovnik and the surrounding areas. Within the city, these can be found at the popular beaches of Copacabana, Mandrač and Sunset Beach. Beyond the city, chair lifts are also installed at beaches in Veliki Zaton and on the Elaphiti Islands – Koločep, Lopud and Šipan – making the Adriatic coastline more accessible than ever.

Further afield, accessible facilities are also in place in Župa Dubrovačka and Cavtat. In Srebreno, a chair lift is installed on the first pier, accompanied by a mobile ramp that allows wheelchair users to enter the sea with ease. The approach to the beach has been completely adapted, including the surrounding promenade and parking facilities. In Cavtat, a sea-access chair lift is located at the beach of Hotel Croatia and Remisens Epidaurus. In nearby Konavle, numerous spots, including the charming village of Molunat, are readily accessible by wheelchair. Slano's Mrče Beach also features a dedicated sea-access chair lift, a reserved parking space and a ramp leading directly to the lift.

Dubrovnik

Lokrum Island

A short 15-minute boat ride from Dubrovnik's harbour, Lokrum is a nature reserve filled with exotic botanical gardens, wild peacocks and shaded pine trails. Visitors can swim in the island's saltwater lake known as the Dead Sea, explore the remains of a 12th century Benedictine monastery, or relax in quiet coves far from the city crowds. Lokrum is a true green sanctuary, perfect for a half-day escape.

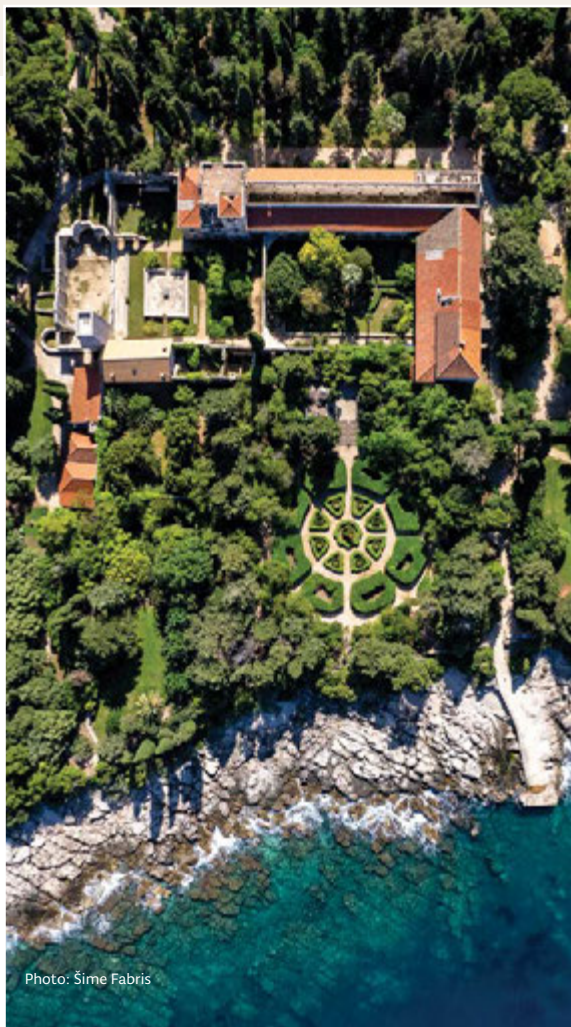

Trsteno Arboretum

Just 20 kilometres northwest of Dubrovnik is one of the oldest and most beautiful botanical gardens in the region, dating back to the 15th century. Once the summer residence of the noble Gozze (Gučetić) family, the estate is home to a magnificent Renaissance villa, a 70-metre-long aqueduct and a collection of exotic plants from around the world. Towering plane trees, some over 500 years old, shade gravel paths that wind toward a spectacular sea-view pavilion.

Rupe Ethnographic Museum

Housed in a 16th century stone granary carved into the bedrock below the city, Rupe museum is a tribute to the ingenuity and resilience of Dubrovnik's citizens. The deep stone silos, once filled with emergency grain, remind visitors of a city always preparing for siege or scarcity. Today, the museum offers a rich curated exhibition of traditional costumes, tools and rural crafts, preserving the textures of everyday life in the Dubrovnik region.

Sokol Fortress

This medieval fortress perched on a cliff offers commanding views of the Konavle valley and the mountains beyond. Recently restored, it provides a fascinating look into the region's turbulent past and its defensive strategies. Visitors can explore the ramparts, towers and archaeological finds that bring centuries of history to life. Its location makes it a perfect spot for photography and reflection.

Bukovac House

In a quiet street above Cavtat's waterfront, Bukovac House is the birthplace of painter Vlaho Bukovac (1855-1922), the founder of modern Croatian art. The restored stone home now serves as a museum dedicated to his life and work. Inside, visitors can see paintings from different periods of his career alongside personal objects and remarkable murals created by the artist as a teenager. A captivating place to discover the story of one of Croatia's most influential artists.

Župa Dubrovačka

Parish Church of St. Hilary

Standing in the heart of Župa Dubrovačka, this church reflects centuries of local faith and craftsmanship. Its simple yet elegant design invites quiet contemplation. Cultural events and festivals often take place here, connecting visitors with the community's traditions. It's a reminder of Župa's deep-rooted heritage.



Natural Springs at Mlini

The village of Mlini takes its name from the mills once powered by these fresh-water springs, which still bubble up beside shaded stone walkways. It's a place where nature and heritage come together, a cooling refuge on a summer's day. The sound of running water and chirping cicadas offers a calming soundtrack as you explore the charming old bridges and restored mill houses. A quiet treasure tucked away from the crowds.

Dubrovačko Primorje

Rector's Palace in Slano

This elegant 15th century palace was once the residence of the Dubrovnik Republic's local governor. Today, it stands as a quiet symbol of Renaissance refinement on the Adriatic coast. Its arched loggia and peaceful courtyard are beautifully preserved, offering insight into the region's political and architectural past. A must-see for history lovers exploring beyond Dubrovnik's city walls.

Heritage House

Located in the coastal village of Slano, just a short drive from Dubrovnik, the Heritage House of Dubrovačko Primorje offers a glimpse into the traditions and maritime heritage of the region. Set inside a restored historic Parish Court building once damaged during the 1990s war, the centre today combines museum exhibitions with a lively cultural space. Visitors can explore displays of early Christian artefacts, traditional costumes and model ships that reflect centuries of local life.

Mljet Island

Mljet National Park

This protected area covers the western part of the island and is famous for its two saltwater lakes, the Great and Small Lakes. Visitors can cycle or hike around the lakes, kayak across their calm waters, or take a boat to the islet of St. Mary with its 12th century Benedictine monastery. The park's landscapes, with their pine forests and turquoise waters, are among the most beautiful in Croatia. Every visit feels like stepping into a peaceful, untouched paradise.

Odysseus' Cave

Known locally as “Jama,” this cave is one of Mljet's most enchanting and legendary attractions. A striking oval-shaped sea cave, carved by centuries of waves and wind, shimmers with ever-changing shades of blue as sunlight sparkles across the water. According to ancient myth, this was the very spot where the Greek hero Odysseus was shipwrecked and held captive by the beautiful nymph Calypso, unable to resist the island's spellbinding beauty.

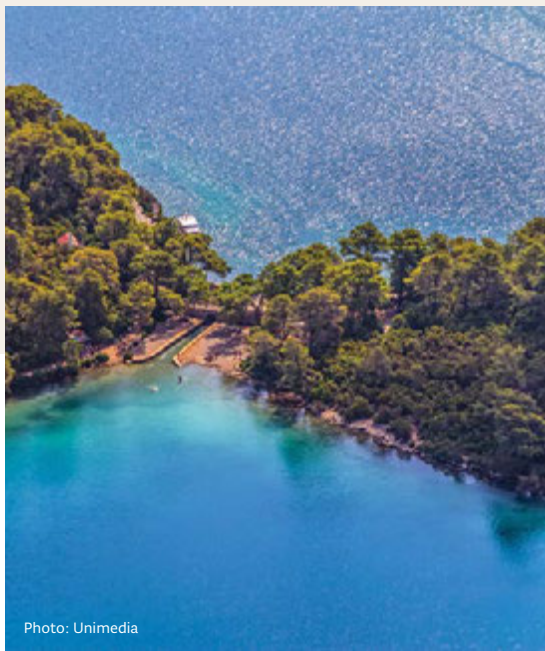
